

Dramaturg's Note

In doing research for the production, I was struck by the clinical descriptions of Elizabeth I's body given by doctors, ambassadors, and members of the court. This was completely within the norms of the Elizabethan era and potential suitors went to great lengths to ensure that their future wife was fertile.

Speculation abounded about Elizabeth's ability to have children after she turned down



marriage proposals. Ambassadors would bribe her privy chamber ladies to reveal whether her menstrual cycle was normal. Contemporary physicians have poured over the remaining records and have tried to diagnose Elizabeth with a range of conditions that might explain why she did not marry. How Elizabeth felt about the loss of privacy relating to her body and reproductive capacities cannot be fully known — perhaps she was prepared for this and expected nothing less because it was just "how things were"? Perhaps there was a part of her that resented this intrusion?

There are some clues that give us some indication of how she may have felt about the situation. In 1558, an ambassador came to petition for Archduke Charles as a possible husband. Alison Weir notes that Elizabeth was hesitant to accept the suit of a man she had never seen, especially after hearing that his head was abnormally large. She then proposed that Archduke Charles come to visit her so that she may inspect him. The ambassador wasn't sure if Elizabeth was joking but it makes me think that perhaps Elizabeth recognized the ridiculousness of the gendered courting behavior and wanted to turn it around by insisting the man be inspected.

Elizabeth's insistence on maintaining privacy has been interpreted as her keeping a secret, instead insisting on control over her own body. As you indulge in the speculative historical universe of the Tudor court, I invite you to take a moment to reflect on where we are today: what has changed? What remains the same? How do you feel about what you see? What can you do about it?




